We encourage our students to think about life beyond university from day one, offering modules and support to give you a competitive advantage on graduating.

Studying a degree in social sciences will help develop skills such as intellectual self-reliance, the ability to process information and make considered judgements, constructive criticism and a willingness to seek solutions. This will enable you to develop transferable skills in communication, team working, problem solving, time management, and information and communication technologies.

Our students have an excellent reputation for finding employment after they graduate. The most recent data shows that 95% of our graduates were in employment and/or further study, due to start a new job or course, or doing other activities such as travelling, 15 months after the end of their course*.

Graduates from the School of Social Sciences choose a variety of career paths including the police service, social work, welfare and housing services, youth work, teaching, community development, counselling and advocacy work.

- jobs board including graduate vacancies, internships and placements



Why study social sciences?





In an increasingly globalised and fastchanging world, it has never been more important to understand the behaviours, attitudes and motivations of people and how opportunity and success is shaped by our interactions with the institutions and structures that surround us.

At its heart, social science is concerned with understanding the relationships and interactions between individuals, groups, institutions and structures. Why do women typically earn less than men? What are the causes of crime? What is the role of the state in providing welfare? Are the social inequalities we observe replicated in our online interactions? Why does educational attainment differ between demographic groups? The social sciences ask the big questions about what is happening in our society.

The School of Social Sciences teaches the disciplines of criminology, sociology, education, human and social sciences, social analytics, and social policy. But the reality is that many of the questions we wish to ask are interdisciplinary.

For example, to understand the causes of crime we must understand how inequality manifests in society through educational attainment. How poverty and deprivation are alleviated (or not) through social policy. How the life chances of an individual are related to their background (family, community) and their individual characteristics (race, ethnicity, social class).

This is why the degree programmes we offer allow you to choose modules from across the school in order to explore these questions from different perspectives. Some of our programmes are designed with interdisciplinarity in mind, such as Social Science (BSc) and Social Analytics (BSc).

In addition to describing the social world, studying in the social sciences is also about observing and understanding change. My own research concerns how society manifests in the online world. This includes the extent to which we can use social media and other new forms of data to understand attitudes, beliefs and behaviours.

Alongside this we might ask ourselves questions about the use of social media itself. Such as how the rise of platforms such as Facebook and Instagram have changed the way in which we interact and communicate. Have a look now at the profile pictures of your friends online – do you notice how masculinity and femininity are performed through the images people choose to represent themselves?

In countless ways the social sciences are essential for making sense of the world around us. Which is why a degree from the School of Social Sciences will equip you for a career in a wide range of organisations including the police service, social work, welfare and housing services, youth work, teaching, community development, counselling and advocacy work.

As social scientists we spend our life trying to make sense of a complex, fascinating and ever-changing society. We would be delighted if you joined us on this journey.

Studying with us

What you study with us will relate directly to current events happening in the world today, and will enable you to understand and contribute to contemporary debates in an informed way.





We are an interdisciplinary school with a strong reputation for academic excellence, ranking 3rd and 10th in the UK for our research in Education and Sociology respectively in the most recent UK Research Excellence Framework (REF 2021) assessment.

All of our degree programmes are designed to teach the foundations of their respective disciplines alongside the theoretical and methodological principles that underpin the social sciences. Many of our programmes provide students with opportunities to tailor their studies by selecting modules related to their academic or professional interests, and to study across the multiple disciplines taught in the school.

The school offers single honours degree programmes in criminology, education and sociology, as well as interdisciplinary single honours programmes in social science, social analytics, and human and social sciences. We also offer a range of joint honours degrees, giving you the opportunity to combine subjects within the School of Social Sciences and from other academic schools.

Many of our programmes offer the opportunity for you to extend your degree to four years, spending the third year on a professional placement or studying abroad.

Teaching

We are an internationally recognised centre of high-quality teaching and research. Our degrees are taught by researchers at the forefront of their subjects, whose expertise and insight inform governments and policy-makers regionally, nationally and globally. Learning takes place in a variety of formats including lectures, practical exercises, interactive workshops and seminars. We place great value on student participation in teaching and learning, encouraging student feedback on all of our programmes.

Research quality


Our school is an influential centre of research, with specialised centres and groups contributing to a lively research environment. We regularly host research seminars, talks and conferences.

Student experience

Ensuring our students have the best possible experience is at the heart of what we do. All students are assigned a personal tutor who will be your main contact for any academic and pastoral support. You will meet with your personal tutor regularly to discuss your academic progress, receive feedback and advice, and make future plans. We also have an active Student Staff Panel who are integral to the student experience in the school.



Location and facilities



The School of Social Sciences is located in the historic Grade I listed Glamorgan Building in the heart of Cardiff's Civic Centre, a short distance from the main university buildings and our Students' Union.

Our magnificent building houses teaching and learning facilities, including modern lecture theatres with the latest audio-visual technology, ICT suites, seminar rooms, a student support hub, and a friendly and informal café where students and staff can meet and relax.

The Glamorgan Building is a lively, vibrant space in the centre of Cardiff, holding regular talks and conferences as well as being a popular filming location for BBC series, including Doctor Who.

The Bute Library, housed next door to the school in the Bute Building, has an extensive collection of social sciences books available for our students and a dedicated subject librarian to help with all your study and research needs.



Enhancing your experience



Many of our programmes offer the opportunity to enhance your degree by spending a year abroad, immersing yourself in a new culture, or to undertake a professional placement year to develop your skills in the workplace.

Spend time abroad

Studying, working or volunteering abroad is a fantastic opportunity to immerse yourself in a different culture, make new friends, embrace a new language and enhance your career prospects. Spending time abroad will help you to develop a wide range of transferable skills prized by employers including independence and responsibility, organisation and time management, problem solving, communication skills, and adaptability and resilience.

The majority of our programmes offer the opportunity to extend your study to four years, spending your third year studying abroad. Our students can also undertake research projects, work and volunteer in institutions around the world.

Professional placement

Many of our programmes can be extended to four years, with the third year spent on professional placement. Students who undertake a professional placement develop their employability skills, gain insight into an organisation and a career, and begin to develop a network of professional contacts.

Our students have secured year-long placements at a range of organisations through Government Social Research (GSR) including Department for International Trade, Department for Work and Pensions, the Home Office and Welsh Government.

If available on your chosen programme, you can apply to extend your study to four years in your second year.

Our degree programmes

Social Science BSc

UCAS Code: L301



This interdisciplinary degree allows you to combine the theories and methods of different disciplines to increase knowledge and understanding.

This flexible and highly customisable programme allows you to study across the social science spectrum, encompassing sociology, criminology, education, social analytics, social policy and psychology.

The unique flexibility of this programme means that you can sample a broad mix of topics from across the wide range of available options, or you can organise your studies thematically and gain multiple perspectives of the same topic, such as gender, ethnicity and inequality.

Criminology **BSc**

UCAS Code: L370



We provide an opportunity to study criminology as an interdisciplinary degree, combining the theories and methods of multiple disciplines to increase knowledge and understanding of crime and control.

The study of criminology investigates how social groups or behaviours are defined as 'criminal' or 'anti-social', how different approaches to criminal justice policy balance protection, rehabilitation and control, and how victims are affected by their experiences.

Our programme draws on a range of social science disciplines including sociology, social policy, law, political science, history, and anthropology. Study focuses on developing the 'criminological imagination' within the social sciences, beginning by examining how to approach problems of crime, justice and control as a social scientist before applying these research-driven disciplinary skills to reveal real world issues and debates.

During the course you will develop a specialised appreciation of criminological research and the operation of criminal justice and crime control processes.

This programme is designed for students who are looking for the opportunity to study the subject in a broad social science context.

Education is a stimulating and challenging social science subject that explores and questions the social, psychological, political and economic foundations of education. Teaching on this programme is informed by our research in education and the latest developments in policy and practice, encompassing aspects of culture and identity, childhood and youth, gender and ethnicity, and social justice and inclusion.

Students benefit from our close links with policy makers as well as local schools, colleges, and other education and training organisations. On this programme you will have opportunities to engage with educators and practice to develop your own experience, and to apply theory and practice to real life situations.

The core modules of this programme are aimed at developing a deep understanding of the social, historical, political, economic, and developmental contexts of education in Wales, the UK and internationally, allowing you to consider education in a global context.





Social Policy **BSc** (as a joint honours programme only)

Social policy is the study of how societies respond to human need and seek to promote the wellbeing of their members.

The study of social policy provides a critical understanding of the challenges of responding to human need, and managing the provision of social services. You will study debates about the goals of policy: how we decide what human needs are, whose responsibility it is to meet human needs, and what we mean by 'social justice'.

Our programme examines policies in a wide variety of areas, including social security, education, health, housing and personal social services, as well as policies seeking to address new challenges such as tackling global warming and promoting environmental sustainability.

A degree with social policy provides you with a thorough grounding in key debates and theories regarding the state, society and wellbeing. You will learn how to evaluate and interpret evidence, apply theories and examine policies in an objective fashion.

Social Policy is available only as a joint honours programme with another discipline.

Pursue one of the oldest and most prestigious social science disciplines in one of the UK's largest and most successful centres of social science.

Sociology is dedicated to the study of social life as found in groups, institutions and societies. A degree in sociology provides critical tools for handling the analysis of all aspects of social conduct, from the intricacies of face-to-face interaction to the ways in which individual actions and beliefs shape, and are shaped by, the social world around them.

Our programme is characterised by rigorous theoretically-informed empirical research. Expertise amongst our staff includes childhood, youth and ageing, the study of sexuality, health and the body, the construction and reconstruction of identities, the rise of consumer culture, and the profound transformations to social, culture and private life which economic and technological globalisation have delivered.



Human and social sciences is a unique opportunity to study psychology alongside modules from other disciplines across the school.


Accredited by the British Psychological Society as the basis for graduate membership of the society, this course provides an integrated perspective on psychology, which emphasises its social, conceptual and historical aspects, along with a core of social research methods.

The only course of its kind currently on offer in the United Kingdom, this programme will allow you to build up a range of skills and knowledge whilst developing a critical understanding of psychology as a social science in a range of issues such as social change, gender, class and ethnicity.

In addition to core modules in psychology and social research methods, you will be able to study a wide range of modules in education, sociology, social policy, and social analytics. The flexibility of this programme allows you to tailor your optional modules to a particular pathway if you have a specific career in mind. Alternatively, you are able to pursue an interdisciplinary approach by studying a range of topics and debates from across the social sciences.



Social Analytics BSc

UCAS Code: J3G5



Every day we read news headlines quoting figures relating to everything from Brexit and migration to teenage pregnancy and sexual health.

In a world saturated with data, figures and statistics, social analytics is concerned with making sense of the social world that we live in by critically evaluating the knowledge claims being made.

This programme offers a unique opportunity to investigate our society through quantitative research via a range of disciplines including sociology, criminology, human and social sciences, social policy and education. Social analytics is an interdisciplinary degree suitable for students interested in themes that cut across the social sciences such as inequality, health, deviance, gender and ethnicity.

This is the only programme in the school with a guaranteed work placement. Recent placement organisations include the

Welsh Government, Agored Cymru, Welsh Blood Service, Chwarae Teg and the Wales Wheelchair Basketball Association.

Distinctive features

- Designed to meet growing demands from employers for social scientists trained in quantitative research methods
- A credit-bearing compulsory work placement in the second year
- Extend your study to four years, spending your third year on a professional placement or studying abroad

Criminology and Social Policy BSc

UCAS Code: 8D46

This degree is an opportunity to study both criminology and social policy within an interdisciplinary social sciences context.

You will learn how to evaluate and interpret evidence, apply theories and examine policies in an objective fashion. Criminology modules will focus on criminalisation, victimisation and social responses to crime and disorder. Social policy modules study how societies respond to human need and seek to promote the wellbeing of their members.

This course gives you the opportunity to learn from leading criminologists with strong links to police, probation and prisons, as well as local authorities, and Welsh and UK government institutions.

Our education teaching is informed by our research in education and the latest developments in policy and practice, encompassing aspects of culture and identity, childhood and youth, gender and ethnicity, and social justice and inclusion.

Sociology modules focus on the study of social life as found in groups, institutions and societies. It provides the critical tools for handling the analysis of all aspects of social conduct.

Distinctive features

- A chance to study wider debates around education, laying the foundation for a wide variety of careers
- Extend your study to four years, spending your third year on a professional placement or studying abroad
- Modules on offer reflect staff research, including work and globalisation; urban and everyday life; and social media, culture and consumption




Sociology and Social Policy **BSc** UCAS Code: **8K46**

This joint honours programme teaches you how to evaluate and interpret evidence, apply theories and examine policies.

Teaching draws upon a wide range of data and methods to investigate a range of social issues and help you make your own contribution to understanding and improving society.

Social policy modules study how societies respond to human need and seek to promote the wellbeing of their members. Sociology modules will focus on social life as found in groups, institutions and societies. You will study the critical tools needed for handling the analysis of all aspects of social conduct, from face-to-face interactions to how economic forces shape and are shaped by global society.

Law and Criminology **LLB**

UCAS Code: M190

Gain hands on experience of law in the real world.

This challenging and stimulating programme enables you to build the skills required for a career in law, or a wide range of professions. Criminology modules will focus on criminalisation, victimisation and social responses to crime and disorder.

Law modules will offer a comprehensive grounding in English and Welsh Law with a range of foundation modules (important for progression to becoming a solicitor or barrister in England and Wales) but you will also examine how to approach problems of crime, justice and control as a social scientist and apply your new research-driven skills to real world issues and debates.

Journalism, Media and Sociology BA UCAS Code: LP35

This degree is delivered in partnership with the School of Journalism, Media and Culture and offers an opportunity to explore current debates in sociological concepts and methods, communications and media studies.

Your sociology studies will help you to make sense of the social and cultural contexts in which journalism is rooted and to which media debates respond – such as the changing nature of media networks, and shifts in the nature of work, leisure and family life.

Journalism and media modules will introduce many of the key themes, concepts, frameworks and skills necessary to begin your critical analysis of the media, your study of journalism and your understanding of mass communications.

Welsh and Education BA


This joint honours course gives first-language Welsh students the opportunity to combine study of Welsh with educational policy and development theory.

Modules taught by the School of Welsh aim to produce graduates with a thorough academic and practical understanding of the Welsh language, its literature and culture, a high level of skill in written and spoken Welsh and well-developed employability and creative skills relevant to modern Wales.

Bustling with personality, Cardiff is a city made for students, offering an endless string of entertainment opportunities while remaining inexpensive and easy to navigate.



Entry requirements

A Levels: The school usually requires three A Levels (or their equivalent) in subjects other than General Studies. Our current standard A Level entry requirements range from AAB-BBB depending on degree programme. AS level subjects will not be accepted as contributing to the entry requirements.

GCSE: English at Grade C or its equivalent is required and maths is desirable.

IB: 17-18 points in three Higher Level subjects.

Other: Applications are welcomed from mature-age applicants and those offering qualifications other than A levels, e.g. Welsh Baccalaureate, BTEC, accredited Access courses.

Each application is examined on its merits, but demonstration of active and formal study within the last two years is desirable.

International students should have achieved an overall IELTS score of 6.5, with a minimum of 5.5 in each sub-score, or evidence of equivalent English Language proficiency.


